## THE CNDH AND THE NATIONAL DIF SIGNED COLLABORATION AGREEMENT ALLOWING JOINTLY SUPERVISION TO 13 THOUSAND CHILDREN'S CENTERS

**CGCP/084/14**

March 25<sup>th</sup>, 2014

The National Human Rights Commission and the National Family Integral Development System (Spanish acronym-DIF), celebrated a General Collaboration agreement allowing jointly training activities, of education and awareness in human rights matter.

During the ceremony, the National Ombudsman, highlighted that the Agreement will allow to link efforts within veri-



fication, design, function and attention

to the 13 thousand children's centers operated by DIF along the country.

Before the General Director of the National DIF, Laura Vargas Carrillo, with whom he signed this Agreement, Plascencia Villanueva noted that the family is not an island apart from the social group, but that it is led by universal norms which its accomplishment is of public interest, therefore authorities have obligations and responsibilities in the matter.

Also he pointed out the need to identify women's requirements and the facing conditions millions of older adults, a large majority without retire-

ment pension allowing them to subsist with their increasing needs in medical care terms, social benefits and of assistance required to do effective.



On the other hand the Director of the National DIF noted that last year the National Children's Centers Council was set up and qualified assertive to initiate with the supervision of this places and that jointly with the DIF personnel, the CNDH will visit children's centers and will be able to know the conditions in which they remain.

## THE CNDH AND THE SNTE SIGNED AN AGREEMENT FAVORING HUMAN RIGHTS' EDUCATION

March 31<sup>st</sup>, 2014

The National Human Rights Commission (Spanish acronym-CNDH) and the National Union for Education Workers (Spanish acronym-SNTE), signed a General Collaboration Agreement, that will allow them to promote actions in favor of human rights promotion and education. Thanks to this Agreement, more than half million teachers could take part together with the CNDH in different projects and programs related to training, academic investigation, dissemination and education in the matter.

The Agreement was signed by Doctor Raul Plascencia Villanueva, President of the CNDH and Mr. Juan Diaz de la Torre, President of the National

SNTE.

At the ceremony, Plascencia Villanueva recognized that even human rights are Mexican people's conquest, many of them still have not been taken into consideration within population's everyday life.

At his intervention, Diaz de la



Torre, highlighted that in the SNTE there exists conviction upon that public school is a unique place to promote all human beings' fundamental rights respect and its validity.


Regarding education workers, he stressed that within the new regulatory framework adapted to the educational system, "It is

clear that teachers' labour regarding human rights are protected by the Mexican State and that the SNTE will defend them ever".



The CNDH and the SNTE agreed that the full and effective exercise of human rights, constitutes the most solid basis to go forward in democratic life.

Up to date, the CNDH has instructed almost 30 thousand teachers, 20 thousand of which got training in courses and conferences through the internet. In this event there were given certificates of participation to teachers, part of the first generation being trained by the CNDH, which started on March 3rd, this year, with seven thousand 959 teachers belonging to 37 Union Sections in the country.

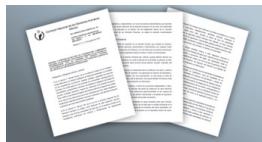
